The Arab world is the focus of many of today's headlines. Wars, conflicts, terrorism dominate the stories about Arab countries. As a result, many Americans are unaware of the rich history of the Arab people and their amazing contributions to world culture.

Each participant will be responsible for one hour, including a ½ hour presentation on a topic related to the topic-either from a list supplied by the moderator or one agreed to by the moderator. The remaining time will be devoted to discussion. Everyone will receive a list of links to online articles to be read as background for the seminar. It is hoped that each person in the seminar will contribute to a robust discussion each week
